This analysis benchmarks the total compensation of **Melissa Ohden, Executive Director / CEO** (\$77,000) against **every comparable organization** that fit the selection criteria — **47** in total — drawn systematically from IRS Form 990 filings, not a hand-picked subset.

Compensation sits at approximately the **68th** percentile of comparable organizations within the typical range

Benchmarked executive: Melissa Ohden — reported title “CEO Non-voting board member”, a **direct title match** to the Executive Director / CEO role.

How comparable organizations were selected

SECTOR Organizations sharing the subject's NTEE classification (R01).

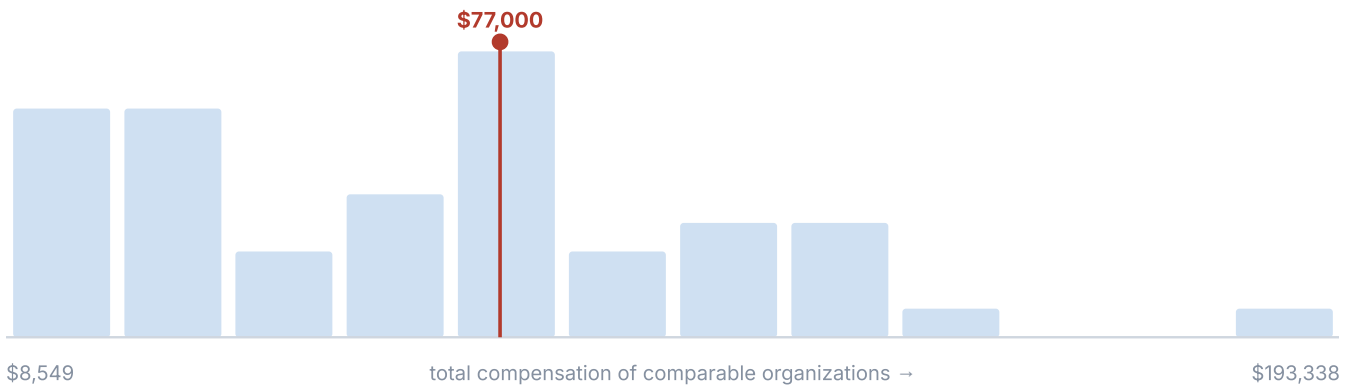
BUDGET Total revenue between \$254,098 and \$568,878 — 0.67x to 1.50x the subject's \$379,252 (the band tightens as size grows).

GEOGRAPHY Same NTEE sector (R01), nationwide + budget 0.67–1.5x revenue.

47 organizations qualified on sector, size, and geography

→ **47** within the band form the benchmarked peer set.

Comp (reported) is the figure on each organization's Form 990 (columns D + F); **Comp (adjusted)** normalizes it to MO cost of living and 2024 dollars. Click any organization to verify the figure on ProPublica.

● Methodology

Comparable organizations were drawn from electronically filed IRS Form 990 returns and matched on sector (NTEE code), budget (a size-adaptive revenue band that tightens as the organization grows), and geography (same-state first, broadening only when too few peers qualify); every organization within the band forms the peer set. To compare fairly across regions and years, peer compensation is normalized to MO cost of living (BEA Regional Price Parities, 2023) and to the subject's filing year (CPI-U). The figure benchmarked is Form 990 Part VII, Section A, columns D + F — reportable pay plus other compensation, benefits, and deferred amounts (column F may include amounts from related organizations) — with the chief executive matched by role. Related-organization amounts (column E) and institutional trustees are excluded. Full methodology: peerbasis.org/methodology.

● Sample, role match & sensitivity

PEER COUNT	47 organizations. Compensation range \$8,549–\$193,338; filing years 2022–2025.
SIZE BASIS	Matched on total revenue (\$379,252); for reference, expenses \$282,904 and assets \$169,153.
ROLE MATCH	Melissa Ohden, reported title <i>"CEO Non-voting board member"</i> , benchmarked as Executive Director / CEO. The title maps directly to this role.
RELATED-ORG PAY	10 peers report related-organization compensation (column E), which the D + F benchmark does not fully capture; review where material.

OUTLIERS 1 peer fall outside 1.5× the interquartile range — consider whether any reflect one-time payments (severance, deferred-comp payouts).

Sensitivity — the subject's percentile under alternative compensation definitions:

If the percentile moves materially across these definitions, the result is sensitive to methodology choices, and the board should weigh which basis best fits its facts.

● Rebuttable presumption of reasonableness · 26 CFR 53.4958-6

Compensation paid by a tax-exempt organization is presumed reasonable — shifting the burden to the IRS — when three requirements are met. This report supplies the comparability data for the second. The board should record the following in its minutes *concurrently* with its decision:

Draft board minutes – executive compensation

1. The compensation of the Executive Director / CEO (Melissa Ohden) was approved in advance by [the Board / Compensation Committee], composed of members with no conflict of interest with respect to the arrangement.
2. Prior to its determination, the authorized body obtained and relied upon appropriate comparability data, namely the PeerBasis Compensation Comparability Determination dated June 9, 2026, comparing compensation against 47 similarly situated organizations (Same NTEE sector (R01), nationwide + budget 0.67–1.5× revenue).
3. The authorized body determined that total compensation of \$77,000 is reasonable (approximately the 68th percentile of comparable organizations) and documented the basis for this determination concurrently, on [date], by a vote of [__ for / __ against].
